








Spring Course Sections by Mode of Instruction, SUNY Total and Sectors as of April 1st











Students Required to be on Campus to Satisfy Course and/or Program Requirements as of 4/1/2021

Spring 2021 Commencement Guidance

New York State Department of Health Authorization of In-Person Commencements Beginning May 1, 2021

Outdoor Graduations:

- Large ceremonies more than 500 people—Limited to 20% of venue capacity; attendees need to provide proof of recent negative test or a completed vaccine series.
- Medium ceremonies 201 to 500 people—Limited to 33% of venue capacity; attendees need to provide proof of recent negative test or a completed vaccine series.
- Small ceremonies up to 200 people—Limited to 50% of venue capacity; with the **option** to require proof of recent negative test or a completed vaccine series.

Indoor Graduations:

- Large ceremonies more than 150 people—Limited to 10% of venue capacity and attendees will need to provide proof of recent negative test or a completed vaccine series.
- Medium ceremonies 100 to 150 people—Limited to 33% of venue capacity and attendees will need to provide proof of recent negative test or a completed vaccine series.
- Small ceremonies up to 100 people—Limited to 50% of venue capacity with the **option** to require proof of recent negative test or a completed vaccine series.

Pursuant to NYS guidance, any individual who fails to present a negative diagnostic test result or proof of immunization, as required, must be denied entry to the event.

Notes: No commencement plans will require NYSDOH approval, however all campuses must notify their local health department or public health authority at least five days prior. Plans are to be shared with the Chancellor's Office.

Fall 2021 Reopening Guidance in Development

- SUNY is *planning* to allow in-person instruction for the Fall 2021 semester. Yet, given the changing guidance, we must be flexible as we plan to ensure that our college communities are safe.
- Chancellor requested input from governance and stakeholders, providing initial thoughts as follows:
 - > Academic Calendar. Campuses may return to their traditional calendars for the Fall 2021 semester.
 - ➤ Basic Health and Safety Guidance. SUNY is subject to federal and state guidance, depending on the issue. Working with a team of SUNY health experts, chaired by Upstate President Dewan and Downstate President Reilly, we are determining rules to incorporate, like CDC-issued spacing guidelines, masking in classrooms, residence hall rules, gatherings on campus, filtration, etc. Health and safety guidelines will remain in flux due to the fluidity of the situation.
 - > **Testing**. Given varying levels of vaccination and that we need to monitor and provide feedback on whether variants are impacting the vaccines, SUNY will adopt a surveillance testing protocol for Fall 2021; likely at reduced frequency.
 - ➤ **Uniform Compliance Guidance**. The Uniform Compliance Guidance will sunset at the end of the Spring 2021 semester barring no unforeseen circumstances.
 - ➤ Vaccines. Right now, we are working to vaccinate as many students, faculty, and staff as possible. We are running various public awareness campaigns. If we do not see enough students, faculty, and staff getting vaccinated, we will *consider* a mandatory vaccine-subject to state law and authority. We will likely do surveys to get a sense of how many students are being vaccinated because we don't have good data at this point.
- The Chancellor invited suggestions on other operational areas to include in the guidance and will hold meetings with shared governance and other stakeholders.



'Big Dreams, Small Step' Enrollment Initiative

THE CHALLENGE: The pandemic has disproportionately impacted certain regions and demographic groups. OUR RESPONSE: A three-step campaign to support applicants and their families.

- Communication of our application support resources directly to applicants, via a paid marketing campaign:
 - Paid ads on social media, paid search engine optimization, and local news outlets from March 10 April 5
 - Ads are targeting NYC and other major NY State metro areas
- Amplification of our message, via an organic communications campaign to leverage SUNY friends and allies:
 - **Government Agencies**
 - **School Districts**





SUNY Student Mental Health & Wellness Task Force


- Staff Assessment out to campuses Dec 2020

LMS Transition: Digital Learning Environment

- Notification to bidders still in restricted period
- Beginning contract negotiation with vendor
 - Current contract through December 2022
- Organizing for Campus Implementation and Transition
 - Broad campus and system representation
 - Multiple cohorts/campus choice
 - Support and training will be provided













Award of Credit by Evaluation: Policy Update

- SUNY's <u>current policy</u>, which dates to 1976, positioned SUNY as a front-runner nationally in recognizing the value of awarding academic credit for learning that takes place outside of the traditional classroom
- Since that time, research has consistently shown this practice is:
 - Proven to increase students' confidence in their ability to succeed, decrease time to completion, and, result in cost savings – when they know about it...
 - > 2021 ACE: National Task Force on Reimaging Transfer and Award of Academic Credit
 - ➤ 2018-2020 studies and reports funded by the Lumina Foundation and the Strada Network and prepared by The Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) and the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL).
- Multiple Attempts to Update:
 - TAACCCT Grant PLA Advisory Board (FCCC representation) Change in Leadership
 - SUNY Micro-Credential Task Force Implementation Team (MCTFI) (FCCC representation) -COVID
 - MCTFI draft sent for comment on March 12 with feedback due to <u>provost@suny.edu</u> on April 7



Award of Credit by Evaluation: Proposed Draft

- Commitment to shared governance remains:
 - "Shared Governance: Campus-level policies and procedures must meet all applicable campus administrative and shared governance procedures for consultation and must undergo a campus governance process equivalent to that for any local academic policy."
- Commitment to faculty oversight remains:
 - "Faculty Oversight: The evaluation of student learning for the award of academic credit must be conducted by the faculty, or equivalent subject-matter experts whose credentials have been reviewed by procedures parallel to those employed by the campus for adjunct faculty."
- Emphasizes Award of Credit by Evaluation as a tool for access to higher education
 - Much stronger focus on communication and recognition of three key times for related communication: recruitment, matriculation, prior to graduation
- Identifies more types of possible evaluation:
 - "Common methods include, but are not limited to...
- Added flexibility around fees



Award of Credit by Evaluation: What We Know

- Although this policy has been in place since 1976, its use across campuses currently varies
 - o Some campuses had offices dedicated to this work at one time, that are no longer staffed
 - Some people may have never heard of this policy!
- Depending on the type of evaluation being done, this work can be complex; however, new resources are available to help (ACE, Lumina)
- Multiple campuses have reached out for resources on high quality approaches to the award of academic credit by evaluation
- Training is imperative and System Administration is committing to providing training
 - > Fortunate to have one the nation's experts in SUNY, Dr. Nan Travers, Empire State College
 - > Will identify other faculty experts across SUNY, particularly across our community colleges
 - > Partnerships with ACE and Lumina



General Education Advisory Committee (GEAC)

- GEAC is a broadly representative committee charged with developing recommendations for SUNY general education policy
- The current SUNY General Education Requirement policy requires baccalaureate and associate (AA and AS)
 degree candidates to have earned 30 credits in at least seven of the following ten SUNY-GER subject areas,
 and to demonstrate two competencies:

Current subject areas:

- Basic Communication (required)
- Mathematics (required)
- American History
- Other World Civilizations
- Foreign Language
- Social Sciences
- Humanities

- The Arts
- Natural Sciences
- Western Civilization

Current competencies:

- Critical Thinking (required)
- Information Management (required)
- GEAC's work covers the second phase of a three-phased process that builds upon the faculty governance-led efforts in Phase I, which resulted in White and Green Papers two foundational documents for GEAC's work
- Phase III, Implementation, will occur in 2021-22

General Education Revision: Some Highlights

- Values established core values and guiding principles to inform revision of SUNY GE Policy
- <u>Compliance</u> identified external policies and regulations that SUNY General Education must comply with, such as Middle States standards and NYSED Commissioner Regulations
- <u>Information Management</u> recommends revisions to the competency and learning outcomes
- <u>Diversity</u> updates existing category of Foreign Language to World Language; recommends establishment of a Diversity Competency with learning outcomes that received initial review for alignment with the Chancellor's 25-point Diversity Equity and Inclusion Action Plan
- <u>Critical Thinking</u> recommends revisions to the competency and learning outcomes
- Global Learning establishes a new competency with learning outcomes for Global Learning, in alignment with the Global Learning for All initiative
- History recommends streamlining of existing categories and updating learning outcomes











Proposed Knowledge Areas and Competencies

- Knowledge Areas eight disciplinary areas of knowledge and skills (minimum 6 of 8 *)
 - Communication Writing*
 - Mathematics (and Quantitative Reasoning)*
 - Natural Sciences (and Scientific Reasoning)*
 - Humanities
 - Social Sciences
 - The Arts
 - US Historical and Civic Engagement
 - World Languages
- Competencies six core competencies that extend beyond discipline-specific knowledge and skills
 - Communication Oral*
 - Critical Thinking and Reasoning*
 - Diversity*
 - Global Learning*
 - Information Literacy*
 - Technological Competency*








SUNY General Education Revision: Spring '21 Timeline

Examine Storytelling
